Goat Resource Handbook 4-H 135R, Sand and Sage Round-Up Fairbook

Breed-Group of goats with similar traits, such as coat, color, head shape, or body conformation, that are passed from generation to generation.

Buck-An intact male of the caprine species.

Cabrito-Refers to a goat carcass that weighs 15 to 30 pounds

Caprine-Of, relating to, or being goat.

Castrate-To remove the testes from a buck so that it cannot reproduce.

Chevron-Term used to describe meat from goats.

Crossbred-Goats with parents and/or close ancestors of different breeds.

Dam-The mother of a kid.

Doe-A female goat.

Forages-Plants used as feed for livestock.

Kid-A young goat less than six months of age.

Purebred-An animal whose parents are from the same breed.

Ration-The amount of food that is nutritionally balanced for a one-day period.

Sire-The father of a kid.

Wean-To start a kid on solid food versus liquid food. Dairy kids are typically weaned at 6 to 8 weeks.

Wether-A castrated male kid.

Know about wholesome and retail meat products.

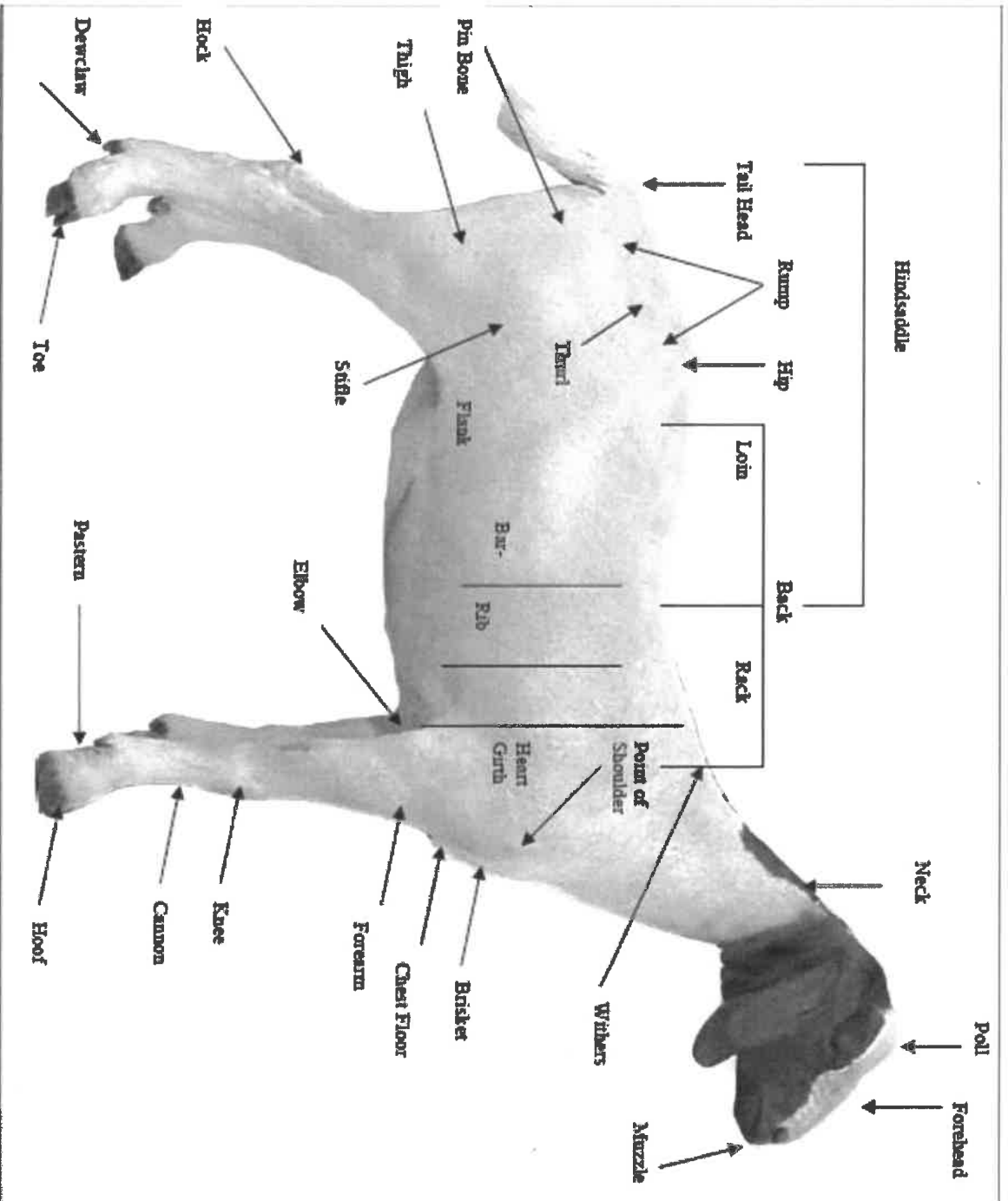
Know some general ways to treat your goat if it should get sick.
